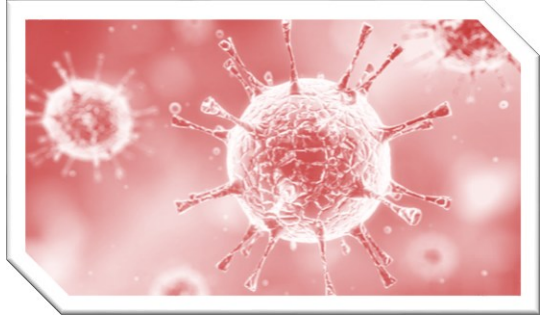
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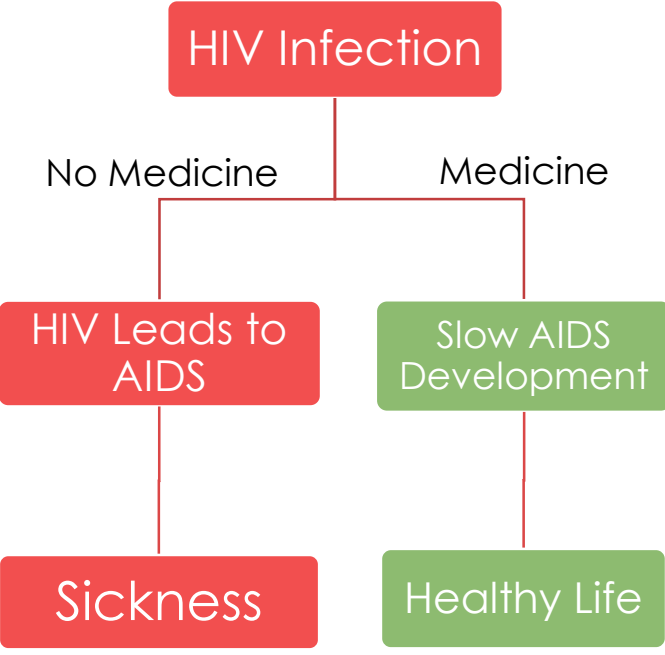


HIV/AIDS Basics

HIV is a **VIRUS**.



Approximately **3 in every 100** people have HIV in Washington DC



How to **PREVENT** HIV/AIDS?

DON'T Touch Blood, Semen, or Vaginal Fluids



Do not touch

USE Condoms During Sex



TALK to a **DOCTOR** before getting pregnant



DON'T Share Needles with Drugs



You **CANNOT** Get HIV/AIDS by:

Coughing or Sneezing



Shaking Hands



Toilet Seats



Kissing
